First, I want to say it has been a privilege and an honor to serve on the SVL HOA Board of Directors these past four years. My first two-year term started out with the normal schedule of once-a-month Executive and Open Meetings in which the Board dealt with the typical decisions that an HOA Board has to manage: Issues with Homeowners, contracts, employees, vendors, legal problems, the reserves, and the annual budget. However, when the opportunity/ necessity to purchase the SVL Country Club "fell" into our lap (due the combined efforts of Board Member Brian Hurst and the wellknown community member Joe Brady) the responsibility of the Board took on a much more serious role. Suffice it to say that the next 3 years were filled with way more Board activity than anyone could have imagined would be necessary. Ultimately, the SVL CC (now Bear Valley CC) was purchased by a company that agreed, in writing, to keep the golf course as a golf course in perpetuity; this was a better-than-expected outcome for our community.

By the way, I purposely did not mention what impact the Covid-19 Pandemic had on how and when the Board could meet or the decisions that had to be made, taking into account the constraints this virus imposed on our HOA. At this point, we are all glad to move on from that topic.

JoAnne Romero is a thoughtful, devoted Board member that always had insightful input to offer based on her long history of living in the SVL HOA community since before the streets were even paved and having witnessed, first-hand, the growth and maturation of our little piece of heaven. Her devotion was evident in her consistent attendance and volunteering for subcommittees as well as her service as a board liaison to the Architectural Committee.

Cheri Boyd brought a Human Resources perspective to the Board that was important in helping the entire board understand the nuances and pitfalls that running a business such as an HOA can have on a regular basis. She has also been an active participant in several subcommittees; and her ability to organize and summarize highlights her professionalism.

Bill Scott apparently doesn't understand that being retired means one can slow down and enjoy life. Instead, he came on the Board and poured his energy, experience, and knowledge into numerous HOA projects, providing insights that have helped the rest of the Board understand the mechanical and engineering side of projects that were either already underway or in need of being addressed. His business experience helped him bring aspects to light that were important to helping the Board make more knowledgeable decisions.

Brian Hurst is the type of person that you feel lucky to have on your team. He is both serious and light-hearted, but always has valuable input. I have little doubt that The Man Above put him in the right place at the right time so that his passion for golf would coincide with being within earshot of a conversation—while out of town playing golf -that resulted, ultimately, in the sale of the SVL CC to the SVL HOA and immediate sale of that SVL CC to the current owners, thus preserving the golf course in our Jewel of the Desert.

Brad Letner is one of those natural leaders that isn't afraid to quickly whittle down a problem to the specific issue, make a recommendation, and move on to the next item on the agenda. Or, if more information is necessary to make a recommendation, he doesn't hesitate to recognize this fact and press for that information to be obtained. While this may have taken some getting used to for the rest of the Board it served a valuable and necessary purpose when the Board would get bogged down and not see for the forest for the trees. No one on the Board was quicker to make motions than Brad. My suggestion is that every Board should have such a Director to keep the momentum going forward.

Brian Bickhart has been the Board President since our previous Board President stepped down. I admire his willingness to serve in that role because it takes a HUGE commitment of time and energy, not to mention the ability to suffer through the many negative comments directed at the person serving this role. In addition, the Board President has a much larger role to play in keeping both Directors and others in line. Brian's stature is matched by his patience but is also reflected in his ability to make hard

decisions when necessary for the good of the SVL HOA. It should be noted that Brian, as the Board President, had to attend even more meetings than the other Directors, a time commitment that few who haven't served in that role can appreciate.

I would be remiss if I didn't mention Al Logan, our General Manager. While not a Board member, he does embody all the traits one could wish for in a General Manager. He is humble, has a good rapport with the staff, he brings issues to the Board that warrant the Board's attention, and he provides background information for the Board if (and when) the Board needs to be involved in making decisions that are larger than the day-to-day running of the HOA. Al is also wise enough to constantly educate himself on the ever-evolving practice of running an HOA by attending seminars and developing a network of contacts with other HOA General Managers; this provides him with a resource base different from what a consultant might offer and has been used to the advantage of the SVL HOA on multiple occasions.

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
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

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

Lake and Boating Safety are Top Priority for Public Safety.

While residents are out to play, the Spring Valley Lake Public Safety team is hard at work. Lake and boating safety are top priority during the summer season to ensure maximum safety of all residents with minimal interference to their day.

The SVLA has set rules and regulations that all residents must follow to use the amenities that this wonderful community provides. By doing so, residents are helping Public Safety Officers ensure their safety and the safety of others. Public Safety feels it is necessary to remind residents of some of these rules. Boating rules and guidelines should be read by all residents before going out on the lake.

All residents are reminded to never drink and operate a vessel. It is the same as drinking and driving and it is illegal. According to SVLA Rules and Regulations, Department of Boating and Waterways has determined that alcohol is a high factor of all fatal motorboat accidents in California. Please do not drink and operate a vessel. Please keep in mind that any safety violation can result in immediate citation from a Public Safety Officer.

Residents who have homes on

the lake are not allowed to swim past the 16-foot easement from their property. Wind, current, exhaustion and swim experience are very serious factors to be aware of while in the water. Failure to pay attention to these factors could be fatal, however, Public Safety enforces these rules and regulations to help prevent situations like this from happening.

It is important to remember that the speed limit in the main body of water is 35 mph. Boaters need to consider that not everyone will be going the same speed. Boats that are pulling a skier or tuber will be driving at slower speeds. Please keep in mind that faster speeds can equate to less reaction time to avoid other boats or people in the water.

Speeding and creating a wake has been a continuous problem within the no wake zone. Speeding is not allowed and is in no way tolerated within this area of the lake. Boaters speeding within the area could put paddle boarders and swimmers in immediate danger. According to SVLA Rules and Regulations, paddle and row boats, kayaks, and canoes shall remain within the "No Wake" areas.

There has been some confusion about the buoys, once a ves-

sel has passed an orange buoy it must reduce speed to avoid creating any sized wakes. Water to the right of the orange buoys and within the channels is considered the no wake zones. Once boaters enter the no wake zone, they will see white buoys that say, "no wake zone". These are here to remind residents that they are currently in a no wake zone. Vessels creating a wake in a no wake zone can also cause damage to the lakefront homes property.

When beaching a boat, be mindful of the wakes that arise from your boat when entering the no wake zone. Those wakes travel and could cause other boat passengers to lose their balance and/or fall into the water and injure themselves. Many boaters wish to enter and exit the beaching area at the same time and there is limited room. Be mindful to remain a safe distance from other boats to be as safe as possible.

Personal watercrafts (PWC), such as but not limited to, jet skis and sea-doos, have certain restrictions set by California State Boating and Waterways and Spring Valley Lake Rules and Regulations: Operators will not jump another vessel's wake within 100 feet of the vessel creating the wake, including any other PWC, water skier, or any allowable towed object. Operators will not drive so fast and close to another vessel that they cause the other operator to

swerve at the last minute to avoid collision. PWC operators will not drive towards any person or vessel in the water and turn sharply at close range to spray that vessel or person. PWC operators shall not tow any device or skiers while on Spring Valley Lake.

The Public Safety Department advises boaters to go through a pre operation check list before going out on the lake. The vessel inspections list can double as a pre operations check list to make sure your boat is fully prepared for any situation that may occur while on the lake. Additional recommended equipment that is beneficial to have while boating on the lake: a paddle, bucket/pump, first aid kit, and throwable buoy.

It is required that all boats are equipped with functioning front and back navigation lights. According to the SVL Rules and Regulations, Navigation lights must be kept in serviceable condition and displayed in accordance with the Rules of the Road between sunset and sunrise and at other times of restricted visibility.

Thank you for your attention towards these important matters. The Public Safety Department looks forward to working with all residents to maintain proper lake and boating safety. Prioritizing the health and safety of our community will ensure another wonderful summer in the "Jewel of the Desert".

Lake Hours for the Season

As our summer season is getting ready to begin, I just wanted to remind everyone that the lake hours will be extended to midnight starting on Saturday, May 27, 2023 and will end on Labor Day, September 4, 2023. Please remember, if you are on the lake after sunset, the entire lake is "no wake" speed, and you will be required to use your Navigation lights.

5.4.2.2. From sunset to 10:00 p.m. daily except during the

period beginning at sunrise on the Saturday of Memorial Day weekend and ending at midnight on Labor Day when the period shall be extended to midnight.

5.5.1.4. Navigation lights must be kept in serviceable condition and displayed in accordance with the "Rules of the Road" between sunset and sunrise and at other times of restricted visibility.

SECURITY DISCLAIMER: We hope that our security systems and Public Safety Department provide some deterrence to crime. However, no matter what steps we take, the Association can never be completely safe and secure. For example, it is possible for someone to enter the property under false pretenses to commit crimes, for residents to commit crimes against their own neighbors, and for guests of residents to commit crimes. As a result, the Association is not and can never be free of crime and we cannot guarantee your safety or security. Accordingly, you should NOT rely on the Association to protect you from loss or harm. Instead, you should provide for your own security by taking common sense precautions such as carrying insurance against loss; keeping your doors locked; refusing to open your door to strangers; asking workmen for identification; installing a security system; locking your car; etc. Additionally, the duties of the Public Safety Department personnel are ONLY to patrol and secure the various Association properties and amenities and to observe and report on service calls, suspicious activities or violations of the Association's Rules and Regulations, where applicable.

RULES & REGULATIONS REVISIONS

- **2.2.1.** Identification cards a plastic or paper form, wallet-sized card, provided by the Association, which identifies various categories of authorized users of Association facilities. These cards are to be used in conjunction with another form of identification (i.e. drivers license, student ID. SVLA Identification cards are issued to all members that are 9 years of age and older.
- 2.5. Guest passes are required for persons 9 years of age or older that are non-residents. The owner(s) of each lot receive(s) 4 guest passes. Up to 6 extra one-day guest passes may be requested from the association office 4 times per fiscal year. Extra one-day guest passes will not be issued on Association event days. Owners may allow anyone to use the passes except for tenants renting or leasing homes in Spring Valley Lake. Owners who allow tenants to use their guest passes are in violation of these rules and may be cited.
- 7.2. Use of the Spring Valley Lake beach area is limited to Members and their guests. Each guest must have an Association issued guest card in their possession when using the facility. This rule does not apply to guests under 9 years of age. Children under 12 years of age must be accompanied by a person at least 16 years of age who is a competent swimmer

This consultant will provide us with their findings and give recommendations as to how we can improve the integrity of our lake, moving forward. The existing docks, that were housed in the middle of the lake for the duration of the lake lowering, were moved back to the Marina on April 21, 2023 and are being inspected for repairs. The two slips that are

being replaced were taken to east beach, We have also acquired a lake consultant where we had a crew demo and dispose of

> Phase 1 of the dock replacement is also underway. All materials have been delivered onsite and our vendor has begun to assemble and install them in the marina. You will be seeing a lot of activity in the Association parking lot and marina, over the next month, as they are being completed. They are estimated to be done by June 1, 2023. If you are interested in renting a slip, contact the Association Office to find out what the process is, as we expect them to fill rather quickly.

CODE ENFORCEMENT

With the lake rising and opening to full speed soon, I know residents are chomping at the bit to get out there and enjoy this warmer weather. Before you head out for some sun at the lake or head out for a family vacation, take a second to look at your home and see if there is anything that has fallen into disrepair. We will be doing our annual inspections throughout the community. Upon completion, this will commemorate half a decade since we started doing them. Being proactive with these items can save you some time and hardship; so take it into consideration. A list of some of the things we will check during these inspections has been included in this paper for your edification should you not know what Code Enforcement looks for on these inspections. This list is not all inclusive of everything we look for but is a good start for the property owners to work on. Please do not neglect some of the everyday

things like not parking on unimproved surfaces, leaving your trash cans out longer than 24 hours before and after they are picked up, or leaving vehicles parked unused for long periods without being moved. We realize that having multiple issues pointed out can take some time for you to resolve, so we will be giving 30 days for any annual inspection violations instead of our typical two weeks. Should you have any questions about this process, feel free to call the office or email code@svla.com and we will happily help you with any questions. Finally, we want to say goodbye to one of our Code Officers, Chelsey Williams, and welcome our two new seasonal employees Adan Arciniega and Gloria Pena who will be helping with our annual inspections this year. 

Since its visual conception and design to present, the SVL Veteran Monument, an extension of the SVL Veteran Club, operates under its own budget and mission. Courtyard Paver Sales are designated to "Spouses of DAV's Scholarship Fund" and SVL Veteran Affairs and Events. Additional costs, Flag Poles, Flags, Lighting, Maintenance, Insurance and cost over-runs have been covered via private funds.

Presently the SVL Veteran Monument has embarked upon a rehabilitation project estimated at \$5000.00, and is seeking financial assistance from SVLA Veterans, Members, and local businesses with this project.

PROJECT & ADDITIONAL COSTS:

Dust to Dawn AC lights for each Flagpole, requiring 110' of underground wiring, junction box, etc. The courtyard will have individual lighting with multi-auto changing colors matching Military and National Holidays. Biweekly cleaning requires 140' of water piping. A media/sound system with the ability to Honor each Military Service branch's birthday, plus notable Military and National Holidays, with proper music, four times that day. Proper lighting for holidays such

as Christmas.

Added to rehab costs, the Monument needs another year's supply of Flags (National, Military Branches, notable Military Dates and POW.MIA), monthly maintenance costs, 2023/24 Insurance.

Upon hearing of the project prior to this announcement, Joseph W. Brady, The Bradco Company, cut a check for \$500.00. He asked me to state, he challenges other local companies to match, for SVL Veteran Monument is an established Historic Landmark via Google maps.

As curator of the SVL Veteran Monument, I am requesting 200 \$25.00 tax deductible donations from a combination of SVL Veterans, SVLA Members, local establishments, SVL and SVLA Clubs or Entities.

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THE VICTOR VALLEY COLLEGE **MYSTERY TOWER**

Tens of thousands of people pass by Victor Valley College each week, and see the tall, slender, obelisk-style tower on the northeast corner of Bear Valley Road and Spring Valley Parkway. What is it? Is it an old air raid siren from times long past, a bell tower for the College, or possibly a tall vent for some underground infrastructure? It is none of these. How many people actually know what it is and the history behind this landmark. Very few at best!

Prior to 1969 the land which is now known as Spring Valley Lake was largely undisturbed desert. When the Boise Cascade Home and Land Corporation envisioned a major new development on this land in the late 60's, they had to develop a Master Plan. The land they were going to develop extended from Bear Valley Road on the south to Yucca Loma Road on the north, and from Ridgecrest Road on the west to Apple Valley Road on the east. This was about the same time that Boise Cascade Recreational Properties, Inc. was developing the land they owned around Lake Arrowhead.

The Spring Valley Lake project encompassed an incredible amount of land and communicating with various construction crews and other personnel throughout the site was a major issue to tackle. Boise Cascade came up with a solution that served two purposes. The tower was constructed as a tall communications antenna that could reach throughout the project site. It was also intended to be a landmark for Boise Cascade to let everyone know where Spring Valley Lake was located. Apparently the landmark concept of this tower paid off well. According to Bob Sher, one of the original Spring Valley Lake Salesmen, they took reservations for 1,000 lots in the first weekend.


The tower was built in the fall of 1969 for \$15,000. It was constructed by the Leo Chase Construction Company in five sections in 63 days. Just adjacent to the tower is a building now known as Building 10 at Victor Valley College. It served as the Spring Valley Lake sales office which opened on October 25, 1969, and also supposedly contained a convenience store. Back then even some of the Boise Cascade management did not know the purpose of the tower. Peter Lacques from Boise admitted that "This tower does not have a functional use. It is just a landmark to indicate where Spring Valley Lake is."

The community and visitors knew well where Spring Valley Lake was by 1974, and Victor Valley College purchased the land and sales office, as well as the strip center across the street for \$349,000. The initial intention for the strip center land was to create a Student Services Center. The Tower was included in this deal, but it was probably just an afterthought, with no idea of how this tower would be used in the future.

Everything was quiet until 1987 when the Victor Valley College Board of Trustees began mulling over demolition of the tower. Then College President Ruth Johnson raised questions about the ability of the tower to withstand the powerful desert winds. As opposed to full demolition of the tower, an option was to make structure upgrades to the tower for \$8,000. Johnson asked the Board, "Does it serve any function other than aesthetic value? Would a flagpole be more appropri-Board member Carollee ate?" Stater said "Aesthetically it's not bad". She wanted student input on the crumbling spire that Board member Percy Bakker described as "kind of a landmark for the college." With that acknowledgement of importance, a survey of 166 students and faculty members was conducted in March 1987. More than 54 percent voted against demolition. "Apparently students really want the tower," Board member Frank Bohannan told the San Bernardino Sun newspaper. "They think it's a landmark of the school."

And so the tower was saved by students in search of "something to identify with," as Bohannan put it. It resolutely stands today as an odd monument to nothing in particular. The college had the tower checked out by a licensed engineer about three years ago, and it was deemed safe and in good structural condition. Some minor stucco repairs were made, and the tower was repainted.


