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

I hope everyone had a great 4th of July. The SVLA fireworks show was amazing as usual. I wanted to explain how our process works for code enforcement citations. Since we do not disclose member discipline in open meetings, some people believe there is some sort of selective enforcement going on. I can assure you this is not the case. The association's only tool to promote enforcement when it comes to landscaping, home maintenance, etc. is fines. Many homes in SVL that don't look so good have fines accumulating, some for years. In these cases, we can only lien properties and when the home transfers, we collect. We cannot, however, foreclose for these fines. Foreclosure on the part of the association is reserved for HOA fees only. Most often these fines get paid shortly after being issued. Most complaints we receive about fines are about the lack of a courtesy notice. Courtesy notices are sent through the mail and in the form of a door hanger. It appears that

these are often overlooked. After a certain amount of time, without correction, these courtesy notices elevate to fines. Please, when you receive a courtesy notice, if you cannot complete repairs in a timely manner, contact the association. The staff can give you recommendations on how to proceed and grant you sufficient time to complete repairs. Our goal is for everyone's home and yard to be beautiful and in compliance, not to collect fees. Also, if your courtesy notice requires changes to your landscaping, architectural approval may be required. The feedback I'm getting is that our code enforcement team is doing a great job. Any SVLA members who would like to see a heightened level of code enforcement, please attend our meetings, especially meetings regarding the budget, as increased code enforcement will come by way of increases to our labor budget. Hope everyone has a great month and, as always, see you at the next open meeting!


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Our annual inspections are in full swing, and we have done the first inspection for the front and back of all homes on the lake, golf course, and have started doing new inspections on homes on the Equestrian side. If you do get a notice, make sure to read through it as it will give you important dates and information that residents ask us about often. If a violation asks you to paint an area or trim your trees you will need to paint using the same color or trim the trees and not remove them. If you want to do any changes to the outside of your house like the paint color or removing trees, you will need to submit an Architectural application and get approval before starting any work.

This article has a general guide-

line of some of the things we are checking when completing the inspection so please try to be proactive if you're having a problem with any of the below items. If you're new and you have changed something on the exterior of your house, please submit an application with the changes you already made to get the approval to avoid any citation we would send for this unapproved work.

Please make sure to keep an eye on your yard for weeds popping up as we have sent out a lot of notices for weeds in the community.

Finally, we want to remind the community we are still hiring for a seasonal code enforcement officer. Turn in an application if you're interested in joining our team to help keep our community looking great.

## Preventing Heat Related Illness

Hello Spring Valley Lake Residents, with the summer here it is important to remember to stay cool during days with excessive heat. Here are some tips on preventing heat related illness.

**Stay Cool Indoors:** Stay in an air-conditioned place as much as possible. If your home does not have air conditioning, go to the shopping mall or public library—even a few hours spent in air conditioning can help your body stay cooler when you go back into the heat. Call your local health department to see if there are any heat-relief shelters in your area.

- Keep in mind: Electric fans may provide comfort, but when the temperature is in the high 90s, they will not prevent heat-related illness. Taking a cool shower or bath or moving to an air-conditioned place is a much better way to cool off. Use your stove and oven less to maintain a cooler temperature in your home.

**Schedule Outdoor Activities Carefully:** Try to limit your outdoor activity to when it's coolest, like morning and evening hours. Rest often in shady areas so that your body has a chance to recover.

**Pace Yourself:** Cut down on exer-

cise during the heat. If you're not accustomed to working or exercising in a hot environment, start slowly and pick up the pace gradually. If exertion in the heat makes your heart pound and leaves you gasping for breath, STOP all activity. Get into a cool area or into the shade, and rest, especially if you become light-headed, confused, weak, or faint.

**Wear Sunscreen:** Sunburn affects your body's ability to cool down and can make you dehydrated. If you must go outdoors, protect yourself from the sun by wearing a wide-brimmed hat, sunglasses, and by putting on sunscreen of SPF 15 or higher 30 minutes prior to going out. Continue to reapply it according to the package directions.

- **Tip:** Look for sunscreens that say "broad spectrum" or "UVA/UVB protection" on their labels—these products work best.

## Stay Hydrated

**Drink Plenty of Fluids:** Drink more fluids, regardless of how active you are. Don't wait until you're thirsty to drink.

## Stay Informed

**Check for Updates:** Check your local news for extreme heat alerts

and safety tips and to learn about any cooling shelters in your area.

**Monitor Those at High Risk:** Although anyone at any time can suffer from heat-related illness, some people are at greater risk than others:

- Infants and young children

- People 65 years of age or older

Visit adults at risk at least twice a day and closely watch them for signs of heat exhaustion or heat stroke. Infants and young children, of course, need much more frequent watching.,

## High Blood Pressure Readings Call for Additional Medication

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** I am a 68-year-old female who was diagnosed with high blood pressure at 32. I am 5 feet, 5 inches tall and weigh 130 pounds. I've been taking 240 mg of verapamil for all of these years.

A few years back, my medication started coming in 120-mg dosages, so I started taking one in the morning and one at night. My blood pressure both at home and at the doctor's office is often higher than I think it should be, averaging 138/88.

Recently, I used a 24-hour blood pressure monitor, which showed that more than 50% of my daytime readings were above 140/90, while my nighttime readings averaged 118/82. I am still waiting to hear back from my doctor regarding the results of this test, but I wanted to get your thoughts. Should I be on some other type of medication? Should I alter the timing to get better daytime readings? — E.T.

**ANSWER:** In my opinion, these readings are not ideal. Twenty-four-hour, ambulatory blood pressure readings are usually 5 to 10 points lower than office blood pressure readings, so your average daytime readings are correspondingly higher.

There is strong evidence that in people at high risk for heart attack (such as those who are already known to have blockages), controlling blood pressure to an average of less than 120 systolic (the first or top number) and less than 70 diastolic (the second or bottom number) reduces risk. It's not as clear for people who are at a lower risk, such as people who have high blood pressure without any additional risks.

In my own practice, however, I will

usually try to get my patients close to those optimal numbers, as long as the medication does not cause side effects. In a situation like yours, I would consider additional daytime medicine. More verapamil might be reasonable, but many doctors might use a different medication, such as a diuretic, in the morning to try to get the optimal blood pressure with less risk of side effects.

Very often, the choice of blood pressure medication depends on any other medical issues a person may have. Only your doctor knows enough about your medical condition to make a personalized recommendation.

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** Can you eat eggs if you have a severe allergy to them? I ask this because my grandson vomited after eating scrambled eggs for the first time, so my daughter-in-law took him to four doctors until she found one who agreed with her that he had a severe allergic reaction. (The first three said he did not.) Since then, he has eaten baked foods with eggs in them without getting a reaction. — G.A.

**ANSWER:** Egg allergies are among the most common childhood food allergies, second only to cow's milk. Symptoms of a severe egg allergy can start within minutes of eating an egg product, with skin changes (flushing, itching or swelling) and problems with the airway (swelling of the throat or a change in voice). Not all people — whether they're adults or children — get skin changes, and gastrointestinal symptoms are also common. Although vomiting may occur, other symptoms (looking pale, lethargy or diarrhea) commonly occur.

A single episode of vomiting is not strong evidence of a food allergy. Blood and skin testing are sometimes used to evaluate whether an allergy is truly present.

More importantly, repeated exposure without symptoms is evidence against the diagnosis of a food allergy (although it is possible there was not enough egg in what your grandson ate to trigger a reaction). I strongly recommend a consultation with an allergist.

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
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
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## NEV/LSV VS. GOLF CART

### Neighborhood Electric Vehicle (NEV)/ Low-Speed Vehicle (LSV) Definition (CVC §§ 385.5, 21250)



An NEV/LSV is a motor vehicle that:

- Has four wheels.
- Within one mile can reach a speed of more than 20 miles per hour (mph) but **not more than 25 mph on a paved level surface.**
- Has a 17-digit conforming vehicle identification number (VIN)
- Has a gross vehicle weight rating (GVWR) of less than 3,000 pounds.
- Must be certified to meet Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standards (FMVSS) to be registered and operated on public streets, roads, or highways.
- May look like a golf-cart to the casual observer, but is actually a motor vehicle requiring a **valid California driver license, registration, and insurance.**

#### Operation of NEVs/LSVs

Local authorities, by ordinance or resolution, may restrict or prohibit the use of NEVs/LSVs. An NEV/LSV may:

- **Not** be operated on any road-

way with a speed limit above 35 mph.

- Cross state highways only at controlled intersections. Crossing at uncontrolled intersections is permitted with approval of the local authority governing that intersection. Cross at intersections that have a speed limit above 35 mph, if the crossing begins and ends on a road of 35 mph or less. Be operated as a golf cart within a distance of one mile or less from a golf course or on roads designated for such operation by ordinance or resolution by a local authority.

#### Modified/Altered NEVs/LSVs (CVC §21254)

If you modify or alter your NEV/LSV to go faster than 25 miles per hour, the vehicle no longer qualifies for the relaxed FMVSS established for NEV/LSVs. Your vehicle will be required to meet the same FMVSS established for passenger vehicles. Failure to comply with all necessary regulations may result in a citation.

### Golf Cart (CVC §345) Definitions



A golf cart is a motor vehicle designed to:

- Carry no more than two persons, including the driver.
- Carry golf equipment.
- Have no less than three wheels in contact with the ground.
- Operate at a maximum speed of 15 mph.
- Weigh no more than 1,300 pounds unladen (empty).

#### Operation of Golf Carts (CVC §§ 345, 21115, 21115.1 and 21716)

Registration is **not** required if you operate your golf cart on a highway designated for such use by ordinance or resolution within one mile of a golf course.

You may **not** operate on a road with a speed limit above 25 mph except by ordinance or resolution by a local authority.

#### Modified Golf Carts

A golf cart **cannot** be converted for registration as an NEV/LSV. If you modify your golf cart to go faster than 15 mph or seat more than two persons, the vehicle is considered a regular motor vehicle and must comply with FMVSS for passenger vehicles.



#### Golf Cart Equipment Requirements (CVC §24001.5)

Golf carts must comply with certain equipment standards established by the California Highway Patrol (CHP) to be registered for on-road use. Equipment requirements are outlined in the Motorcycle, Motor Driven Cycle, and Motorized Bicycle Requirements (CHP 888) form available at [chp.ca.gov](http://chp.ca.gov).

You must complete a Statement of Facts (REG 256) form, which states the vehicle meets the definition of a golf cart (CVC §345) and has not been modified. If the golf cart is gasoline-powered, it must bear a label certifying the vehicle complies with California emissions requirements.

If you drive your golf cart on the road it must be equipped with:

- At least one headlamp, tail lamp, and stop lamp.
- A rear reflector.
- Front/rear turn signals.
- Front/side reflectors.
- A mirror (located in a position to allow the driver a rear view of at least 200 feet).
- A horn.
- Fenders.
- A safety-glazed windshield.
- Windshield wipers.

FMVSS include additional vehicle equipment, appropriate FMVSS labels, applicable emission standards, and a 17-digit conforming VIN. Failure to comply with all necessary regulations may result in a citation.

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

He will be greatly missed, I always called him my 'Stepdad' based on all the influence he had on my career", stated Brady.
