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

My Role in the Financial Process

There appears to be confusion about what authority I have as General Manager.

I have never personally written a check for the Association.

I do not keep a checkbook in my office.

I do not store Association funds in my office.

I do not have independent authority to move money between accounts.

Our accounts payable process includes multiple layers of oversight:

- The accounting department selects and processes accounts payable.
- Payments are then reviewed.
- Two Board members — typically the President and Treasurer — approve payments before they are re-

leased.

- My system access is read-only for oversight purposes.

Regarding what has sometimes been referred to as the “GM account,” that nickname existed prior to my tenure. I agree that the name creates confusion and should be updated.

The accounting department writes checks from that account only when necessary and only for unique payment situations that cannot wait for the normal processing cycle. In those rare cases, I verify vendor information, confirm invoice details, review receipts and sign within my Board-approved spending limits.

My point is simple: I do not keep a checkbook in my GM office, nor do I independently issue payments.

For employee final paychecks, two Board members are brought in to sign. (Payroll account)

Petty Cash Clarification

The Association maintains limited petty cash generally for event operations and certain small payments, such as a dinner dance with a cash bar. Current policy caps petty cash at \$500. When that limit is reached, the account-

ing team converts the funds into a money order and forwards it to the contracted accounting company for deposit. All petty cash is documented and reconciled. I do not handle or store petty cash.

Addressing the Targeting

It is important for the community to understand that for the past two years, I have been targeted with repeated accusations that lack factual support.

If anyone truly believes a crime has occurred, the proper course of action is to present evidence to law enforcement. Allegations without proof harm individuals, families, employees, and the As-

sociation as a whole.

Targeting someone through repeated unproven accusations creates division, consumes Association resources, and exposes the community to liability.

I am not asking anyone to simply believe me. I am asking you to request proof, review documented processes, and form your own independent conclusions.

Commitment to Transparency, Improvement, and Open Dialogue

Transparency does not mean claiming perfection. While I firmly stand behind the integrity and the facts outlined above, I do believe there are areas within our accounting structure that needs to be improved.

Strong organizations continuously evaluate internal controls, reporting clarity, oversight procedures, and operational efficiency. The Association should have strong financial control systems, clear separation of duties, and appropriate oversight mechanisms.

We are not just identifying improvements — we are taking action. The Association has recently hired a Director of Finance to strengthen oversight and financial structure, and we are actively hiring for in-house accounting positions, including Accounts Receivable (AR) and Accounts Payable (AP). These steps are designed to increase Association-level control, improve internal accountability, and enhance financial transparency.

The Board and management

will be providing the community with an update regarding next steps at the March Open Board Meeting. We want homeowners to hear directly from us about improvements being implemented and the path forward.

I am willing to meet face-to-face with any member of this community to go over questions regarding this matter. If you provide your questions in advance, I will bring supporting documentation so that our discussion can be factual and productive.

Open conversation, supported by documentation, is how we move forward — not rumors or partial narratives.

For eight years, I have served this Association with integrity. I remain confident that the truth will prevail.

Transparency, accountability, continuous improvement, and facts — not rumors — will guide us forward.

As we move through the early part of the year, February brought warmer-than-usual temperatures, which has kept our Maintenance Department active throughout the community. The warm weather has allowed our crews to begin addressing several outdoor maintenance items earlier than typical for this time of year.

During this time, staff has continued working on routine maintenance throughout Spring Valley Lake, including park inspections, irrigation checks, turf monitoring, and general upkeep of common areas. With the warmer conditions, some turf areas have already begun showing early seasonal growth, which requires our crews to begin monitoring watering schedules and preparing for seasonal fertilization.

Recently, new playground mulch was added at both playground areas at Meadowlark Park to improve safety and maintain the play surfaces. We are currently obtaining pricing to complete a similar request for Playfair Park.

The Lake Department continues regular cleanup efforts as

well. Staff removes floating debris from the lake every Monday and Friday to help maintain the overall lake appearance. In addition, shoreline cleanup takes place on weekends at all fishing areas to ensure those locations remain clean for residents.

Our team is also continuing inspections of community amenities, fishing areas, equestrian parks, and other common spaces to ensure everything remains safe and well maintained for residents.

We appreciate the continued hard work of our Maintenance and Lake Departments and their efforts to keep Spring Valley Lake looking its best. As we move closer to spring, residents may notice crews out in the community more frequently as seasonal maintenance activities begin.

Hey Ho From the EQ

A big THANK YOU to all who braved the rain and attended our February meeting. We value every one of you and know things would not move forward without your input.

ON MARCH 17TH AT 6 PM, YOUR EQ COMMITTEE WILL BE HOSTING A CANDIDATES' FORUM AT THE EQ CENTER. PLEASE ATTEND THE MEETING TO HEAR THE CANDIDATES SPEAK ON VARIOUS ISSUES THAT AFFECT EACH ONE OF US. FOOD WILL BE SERVED FOR THE EARLY BIRDS. SEATS ARE VERY LIMITED.

Instead of purchasing all new pet waste stations, we will be relocating the existing stations to more convenient locations. A few more stations may be purchased if needed. At our last meeting we identified alternative sites that will be more suitable for pets and their owners.

We are continuing our efforts to construct a dog park. Our survey indicated the dog park is most desirable at Play Fair Park. Although we have missed the 5-year budget plan, it is still possible to reach our goal of a beautiful dog park under the trees in our large grass area along the trail. Previously, the SVLA Board voted to restrict all dogs from walking

leashed on the horse trails, which leaves no other option for dog owners except to walk on the road. This has proven to be very dangerous. The board would like additional information from our EQ residents about pets on the trails.

YOUR EQ COMMITTEE, ALONG WITH OTHER ENTHUSIASTIC RESIDENTS, WILL BE WALKING DOOR TO DOOR IN ORDER TO GET YOUR FEEDBACK ON THE FOLLOWING 3 ISSUES-

1. There was a proposal sent out about the DG and wood chip restriction in our front yards. This proposal affects the EQ side differently than the lake side due to our larger lots.

Previous rule:
Architecture Guidelines 7.7.3
The use of decomposed granite (DG), dirt and or wood chips for hardscape is prohibited.

New proposed Recommendation:
Architecture Guidelines 7.7.3
The use of decomposed granite (DG) and/or wood chips for hardscape may be used in limited amounts, not to exceed a total of 200 square feet.

2. Would you like to have the opportunity to walk your dogs on a leash while on

the horse trails? Currently, we are not allowed to exercise our dogs on the trails.

3. **Your EQ committee is responding to a concern about the SVLA amendment regarding the removal of the double rail fence requirement in our backyards. A brick wall or privacy fence is now allowed. Our community stands out for many reasons and one of them is our beautiful equestrian atmosphere. The removal of the double rail requirement changes our community's look significantly. What do we think about the current requirements?**

Previously, SVLA Equestrian Estates had a metal sign on the wall at Bear Valley Road and Reata. When the new wall was constructed, the sign was removed. We are looking into a new placement for the sign and will be working with the town in order to identify a permanent location for the sign welcoming people into our scenic and friendly neighborhood.

CODE ENFORCEMENT

As we head into March and the first signs of spring begin to appear, it's the perfect time to refresh not only our homes, but also our shared commitment to keeping our community beautiful, safe, and welcoming. Seasonal transitions are when small maintenance tasks can make a big difference — both for individual properties and for the neighborhood as a whole.

Winter weather can be tough on homes. March is an ideal time to walk your property; Look for roof and gutter debris - clear out leaves and branches to prevent drainage issues; Check for fence and gate damage – repair leaning posts, loose boards, paint issues or broken hardware: Check exterior paint and siding wear – touch-ups now can prevent more costly repairs later; and Review driveway and walkways for cracks – addressing these early improves both safety and appearance. Paying attention to issues like these and doing routine upkeep preserves property values and keeps our neighborhood looking its best.

As grass and plants come out of dormancy, it's time to pay the landscaping some attention to save you future hassle. Begin regular mowing once growth starts to keep grass at a healthy height. Remove weeds and dead

plants from beds, borders, and any areas of your property. Refresh sparse ground cover or replace your weed barrier under rocks if you have been having more weeds. Trim back overgrown shrubs or tree branches, especially those encroaching on sidewalks or neighboring properties. Landscaping is one of the most noticeable features of any home, and consistent care benefits the entire streetscape.

Our Associations purpose is to support residents while upholding the standards that make this community such a desirable place to live. If you are unsure whether a project requires approval or have questions about property maintenance guidelines, please reach out before starting work. A good rule of thumb is, if you are making a change to the exterior of your property, you will likely need an architectural application. We're happy to provide guidance and prevent avoidable issues. There will be someone in the association office now on Saturdays from 9am to 1pm to assist you with any business you need help with. Thank you for doing your part to keep our neighborhood attractive, safe, and welcoming as we move into the spring season. Together, we make this community a place we're all proud to call home.



Home Safety



Keeping your home safe requires a proactive approach that combines security, modern technology, and everyday awareness. Below are recommendations from Spring Valley Lake Public Safety that property owners can follow to better protect their homes and families:

1. Install a Security System

A good alarm system with door and window sensors, motion detectors, and cameras can go a long way. Many systems now connect to your phone, so you can check in and get alerts wherever you are.

2. Lock and Reinforce Doors and Windows Make sure all exterior doors have strong locks, ideally deadbolts. Check that windows lock properly and consider adding extra security devices for sliding doors.

3. Add Outdoor Lighting Motion lights around entryways, driveways, and darker areas of your property can be

a strong deterrent. Criminals prefer working in the dark, not under a spotlight.

4. Keep Landscaping Trimmed

Overgrown bushes and trees can create hiding spots. Keep shrubs trimmed near windows and doors, and cut back tree branches that could provide access to upper levels.

5. Stay Connected with Neighbors

Knowing your neighbors and keeping open communication helps everyone. They can keep an eye on your home when you're away and let you know if something seems off.

6. Post Security Signs

Displaying security system signs or stickers, even if you don't have a system this can discourage someone from targeting your home.

7. Use Smart Home Features Smart locks, video doorbells, and programmable lights can improve security and make it

look like someone is home, even when you're not.

8. Keep Up with Maintenance

Fix broken locks, windows, gates, or fencing promptly. A well-maintained property shows that someone is paying attention.

9. Build Good Security Habits

Always lock doors and windows, even during the day. Be cautious about sharing travel plans on social media and be mindful of who you allow into your home.

10. Plan Ahead for Vacations

Use light timers, hold mail deliveries, and ask a trusted neighbor to check on your home. Avoid hiding spare keys in obvious places like under a doormat. If you plan to be away from your home for an extended period of time, contact Public Safety at (760-245-6400) to be added to our Residential Check List. This service allows Public

Safety Officers to conduct additional patrol checks of your property while you are gone, providing added peace of mind during your absence. Terms and conditions apply, and a Dispatcher will review all details with you at the time of sign-up. When you do return home please call Public Safety to advise and we will take you off our list.

Taking a few extra precautions and staying alert can greatly reduce the chances of your home becoming a target. Simple, consistent habits and preventative measures truly make a difference when it comes to protecting your property and your family.

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

Record-Breaking Chili Cook-Off

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

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
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
